A Message from the Principal

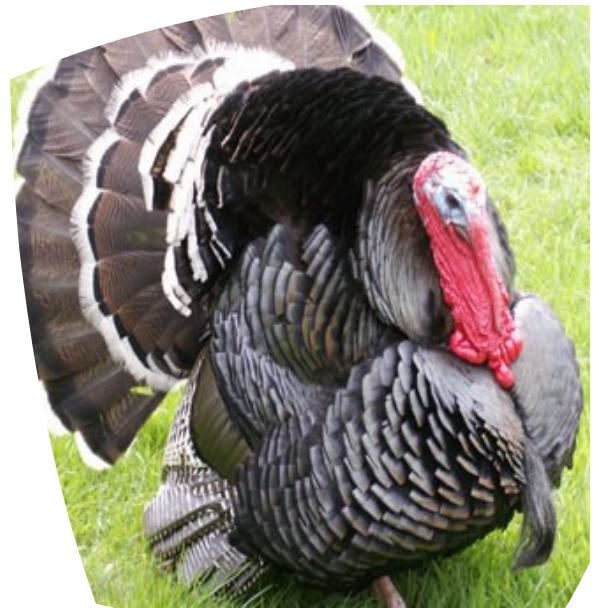
East Central High School and the Sunman Dearborn Community Schools recently received from the State of Indiana school grades for the 2013-14 school year. Not only did ALL the schools in the corporation receive an “A” for efforts; but, for the third year in a row, East Central High School received an “A.” This grade reflects passing rates on our end-of-course assessments for Math and Language Arts as well as perfect scores in graduation rates and college and career readiness.

Some interesting statistics about East Central High School include the following:

- ◆ Out of 2166 schools (all elementary, middle and high schools) listed in this year’s State results, 861 received a 4.0... we are one of them. (top 40%)
- ◆ Out of 2166 schools listed in this year’s State results, 426 received an “A” for the last three years in a row.... we are one of them. (top 20%)
- ◆ Out of 487 HIGH SCHOOLS listed in this year’s State results, 79 got a 4.0... we are one of them. (top 16%)
- ◆ 58 HIGH SCHOOLS in the state maintained an “A” for the last three straight years... we are one of them.

Congratulations to the staff, students and parents for helping this school remain at the top of the academic world in this area.

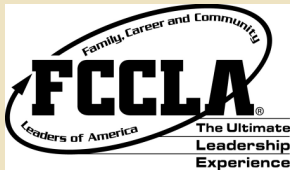

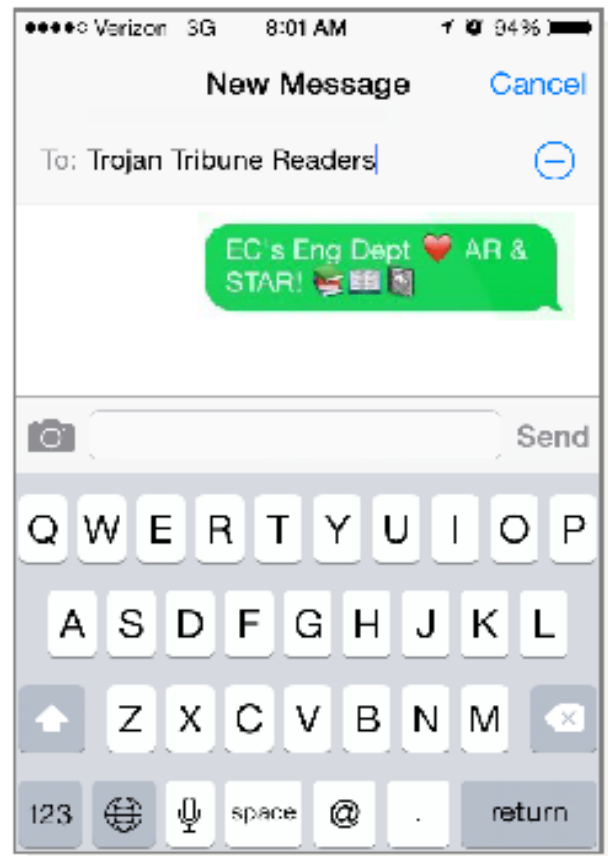
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Reading Resources from EC's English Department

Accelerated Reader (AR) is a component of East Central's English curriculum and has been for several years. Both the English department and the Foreign Language departments use AR to augment their curriculum. Teachers can set personalized goals for each student and easily monitor progress towards goals. Teachers get reliable reports on reading comprehension, vocabulary, literacy skills, and more. A recent change from an "in-house" to a web-based system allows us to access to over 154,000 quizzes. EC's library denotes AR books with a yellow label on the spine. If you are at a bookstore or public library and want to know if a book is an AR book, use the [AR Book Finder](#). 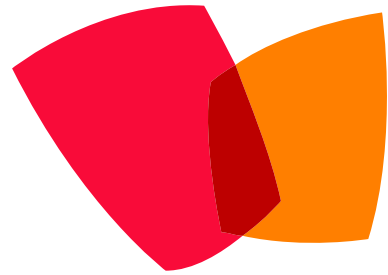

STAR Reading Enterprise is an enhanced version that includes skills-based test items, learning progressions for instructional planning, and in-depth reports. The English department gives the STAR test several times during the school year to monitor and track student progress in reading and literacy.

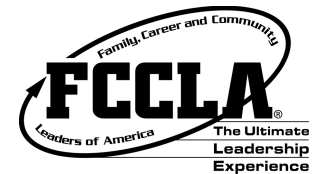
Purdue University's Placement Office also informed FCCLA members through a session called "Oh the Places You'll Go" on business and professional etiquette. This workshop demonstrated to students

Monthly History Lesson

Question of the Month: Was Niccolo Machiavelli serious?

Social Studies

Niccolo Machiavelli (Italian 1469-1527) is one of the most widely quoted political thinkers of all time, and also (quite possibly) one of the most misrepresented and misunderstood. His name has become an adjective to describe cynicism and deceit in politics (or business), but scholars are divided as to what his true intentions were, and what *The Prince* really says about the dawn of republican thought, the nature of Italian government during the Renaissance, and what it all means. Some have suggested that Machiavelli (who praised the noted tyrant Cesar Borgia in *The Prince*) meant exactly what he said, and advocated immoral governance. Others have suggested that he merely wanted political stability (with reforms coming once stability had been achieved). Still others saw his work as an early attempt to recommend the separation of Church and State, or as a clever expose on political corruption. Some have even suggested satire. Here are a selection of quotes from "*The Prince*".

Do you think he was on the level... and really meant these things... or is he putting us on?

** Since love and fear can hardly exist together, if we must choose between them, it is far safer to be feared than loved.*

** When neither their property nor their honor is touched, the majority of men live content.*

** There are three classes of intellects: one which comprehends by itself; another which appreciates what others comprehend; and a third which neither comprehends by itself nor by the showing of others; the first is the most excellent, the second is good, and the third is useless.*

** There is no other way of guarding oneself against flattery than by letting men understand that they will not offend you by speaking the truth; but when everyone can tell you the truth, you lose their*



respect.

** Whoever desires to found a state and give it laws, must start with assuming that all men are bad and ever ready to display their vicious nature, whenever they may find occasion for it.*

** Men judge generally more by the eye than by the hand, for everyone can see and few can feel. Every one sees what you appear*

to be, few really know what you are.

** He who blinded by ambition, raises himself to a position whence he cannot mount higher, must thereafter fall with the greatest loss.*

** If an injury has to be done to a man it should be so severe that his vengeance need not be feared.*

** He who has not first laid his foundations may be able with great ability to lay them afterwards, but they will be laid with trouble to the architect and danger to the building.*

** There is nothing more difficult to take in hand, more perilous to conduct or more uncertain in its success than to take the lead in the introduction of a new order of things.*

** It must be remembered that there is nothing more difficult to plan, more doubtful of success, nor more dangerous to manage, than the creation of a new system. For the initiator has the enmity of all who would profit by the preservation of the old institutions and merely lukewarm defenders in those who would gain by the new ones.*

** War is a profession by which a man cannot live honorably; an employment by which the soldier, if he would reap any profit, is obliged to be false, rapacious, and cruel.*

** God creates men, but they choose each other.*
